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In the News

- A Massachusetts study found that <u>despite universal coverage</u>, <u>patients suffer with</u> pain. Women, elderly and the poor struggle more to get their pain taken seriously & treated to improve daytime activities & sleep at night.
- Prevention Magazine and the Today Show reported on 7 Big Mistakes People Make Regarding Chronic Pain
- FDA approved a once-daily (extended release) formula of hydromorphone Exalgo for mod-severe chronic pain.
- A generic "lozenge on a stick" form of transmucosal fentanyl citrate (equivalent to Actiq) is now available.
- FDA approved <u>a new formulation of OxyContin</u> that can't be easily altered to lower the drug's abuse potential.
- Check out the DEA ruling, effective 6/1/10 on Electronic Prescriptions for Controlled Substances with limits.
- Patient was awarded \$1 million because her physician failed to assess, document and act on her report of pain.
- The FDA announced a new infusion pump safety initiative including analgesic delivery devices to reduce harm

- Thompson LA, Knapp CA, Feeg V, et al. (2010). <u>Pediatricians' management practices for chronic pain</u>. *J Palliative Med*, *13* (2):171-178. Only a third of pediatricians felt that managing their patient's chronic pain was their responsibility. Many are comfortable with prescribing acetaminophen, but not opioids for persistent pain.
- Arnstein P. (2010) Is my patient drug-seeking or in need of pain relief? *Nursing 2010, 40* (5) :60-61. Describes key assessments to help professionals <u>distinguish drug-seeking from relief seeking behavior</u>
- Deyo RA, Mirza SK, Martin BI, et al. (2010). Trends, major medical complications, and charges associated with surgery for lumbar spinal stenosis in older adults. *JAMA*, *303* (13):1259-1265. Despite fewer surgeries, costs have increased as more extensive fusions for spinal stenosis have a 3-fold risk of complications.
- Torrance N, Elliott A, Lee AJ, et al. (2010) Severe chronic pain is associated with increased 10 year mortality. A cohort record linkage study. Eur J Pain, 14(4):380-386. <u>Severe chronic pain increases the risk of death</u> by 49% from any cause and a 68% greater risk of cardiovascular-disease-related deaths than people without pain
- Aftab AR, Donnellan F, Zeb F (2010) <u>NSAID-induced colopathy</u>. A case series. *J. Gastrointestin Liver Dis.* 19 (1):89-91. The contribution of NSAID pain relievers to dyspepsia and upper GI bleeds is well know, but increasingly there are reports of treatable lower GI bleeds and Colopathy resulting from their use.
- Chorney JM, McGrath P, Finley GA. (2010) <u>Pain as the neglected adverse event</u>. *CMAJ*, *182* (7): 732. Treating excessive pain as an adverse event is described as a strategy to promote best practices, remove obstacles to adequate management, and eliminate the common unnecessary cruelty so many patients endure.
- Chou R, Shekelle P. (2010) Will this patient <u>develop persistent disabling low back pain?</u> *JAMA*, *303*(13):1295-1302. Researchers evaluated research already done by others to find predictors of patients who develop disabling low back pain. Of 197 studies reviewed only 20 met study criteria and none met all of the quality criteria. The best available evidence supports the need to pay more attention to psychosocial factors early on.

- Kirthi V, Derry S, Moore RA, et al. Aspirin with or without an <u>antiemetic for acute migraine headaches</u> in adults. Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews. 2010;4(CD008041). High dose aspirin helps some people with migraine headaches, but the benefits must be weighed against potential harm if used too often. When combined with metoclopramide, 1000 mg of aspirin may provide safe, well-tolerated, cost-effective results.
- Wong EM, Chan SW, Chair SY. (2010) <u>Effectiveness of an educational intervention on levels of pain</u>, anxiety and self-efficacy for patients with musculoskeletal trauma. *J Adv Nurs*, *66* (5):1120-1131. Structured education significantly lowers pain and anxiety for hospitalized patients while enhancing self-efficacy during hospitalization (before surgery to day 7), as compared to the control group. The experimental group had more requests for analgesics at day 2 only. There were no statistically significant effects on length of stay. At the 3-month evaluation, a statistically significant effect on anxiety level was found in favor of the experimental group
- Jamison RN, Butler SF, Busman SH, et al. (2010). <u>Gender differences in risk factors</u> for aberrant prescription opioid use. *J of Pain, 11* (4): 312-320. Women tend to use opioids to reduce stress and improve sleep more than men, who are more likely than women to have an underlying substance abuse or addiction disorder. For all patients, closer monitoring of behaviors, urine screens, pill counts and adherence can reduce risk of drug abuse.
