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In the News

- Massachusetts residents may need a letter of medical necessity in addition to a prescription to get certain analgesics despite law suit.
- The movement towards a National Prescription Drug Monitoring Program continues to expand with 24 states now interconnected
- The CDC partners with others to create menus summarizing legal strategies to address prescription drug misuse & overdose.
- The new NIH Interagency Pain Research Portfolio web page helps organize pain research into 3 types, 9 themes & 29 topics.

- Khurana G, Jindal P, Sharma JP, et al. Postoperative Pain and Long-Term Functional Outcome After Administration of Gabapentin and Pregabalin in Patients Undergoing Spinal Surgery. *Spine.* 2014 Mar 15;39(6):E363-8. <u>Preoperative pregabalin</u> (75mg dose) yields less pain with movement & at rest; and less disability at 3 months than those getting a 300mg gabapentin dose or a 7-day "course" of placebo.
- Powers SW, Kashikar-Zuck SM, Allen JR, et al. Cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) plus amitriptyline for <u>chronic migraine in children</u> and adolescents: a randomized clinical trial. *JAMA*. 2013 Dec 25;310(24):2622-30. Youth started on 1 mg/kg/d amitriptyline plus 10 CBT sessions or equal education time showed CBT was better than education in cutting headache frequency, intensity & pain-related disability.
- Gerbershagen HJ, Pogatzki-Zahn E, Aduckathil S, et al. Procedure-specific Risk Factor Analysis for the Development of Severe Postoperative Pain. Anesthesiology. 2014 May;120(5):1237-45. A retrospective analysis at German hospitals comparing 30 surgeries with a total of 22,963 patients shows young age, those with pre-op pain & women have more post-op pain regardless of surgery type.
- Peltier A, Goutman SA, Callaghan BC. Painful diabetic neuropathy. BMJ. 2014;348:g1799. Diagnostic tests & treatments are rapidly
 evolving but guestions remain regarding differences between pain in type 1 and type 2 diabetic neuropathy & the best order of therapies.
- Graham T. Grocott P. Probst S. et al. How are topical opioids used to manage painful cutaneous lesions in palliative care? A critical review. *Pain* 2013 Oct;154(10):1920-8. <u>Topical opioids are clinically useful</u> and safe for controlling inflammatory pain in wounds. The finding that systemic absorption of topical opioids occurs at a safe level is reassuring; particularly as the low doses typically used.
- Kaunisto MA, Jokela R, Tallgren M, et al. Pain in 1,000 women treated for breast cancer: a prospective study of pain sensitivity and postoperative pain. *Anesthesiology*. 2013;119:1410-21. Sensitivity to both experimental and postoperative pain is influenced by anxiety, chronic pain, previous surgery, and smoking. When those are controlled for there is only a weak link between the 2 types of pain.
- Colvin LA, Stein A, Smith BH, et al. <u>Managing chronic pain</u>: a clinical challenge: new SIGN guidelines provide a practical evidence-based approach and identify research gaps. *Br J Anaesth.* 2014 Jan;112(1):9-12. The Scottish Intercollegiate Guidelines Network (SIGN) has developed useful <u>guidelines</u> for professionals and patient <u>booklets</u> to manage chronic pain using a quality approach described here.

- Jahn P, Kuss O, Schmidt H, et al. Improvement of pain-related self-management for cancer patients through a modular transitional
 nursing intervention: A cluster-randomized multicenter trial. *Pain*. 2014 Apr;155(4):746-54. A <u>nurse-taught program reduced barriers &
 cancer pain</u> at 4 months; while increasing knowledge, adherence to medication & non-drug treatments, resulting in a better quality of life.
- Herin F, Vezina M, Thaon I, et al. Predictive risk factors for chronic regional and multiple body sites musculoskeletal pain. A 5-year prospective study in a working population. *Pain.* 2014 May;155(5):937-43. The development of <u>work-related pain</u> is linked to job stress; with pain in men predicted by the job's physical demands & women more susceptible to psychosocial aspects of their work environments.
- Althaus A, Arránz Becker O, et al. Distinguishing between pain intensity and pain resolution: Using acute post-surgical pain trajectories to
 predict chronic post-surgical pain. Eur J Pain. 2014 Apr;18(4):513-21. The trajectory of pain the first 5 days after surgery predicts the
 development of chronic pain. Depression appeared to hinder recovery in contrast to better pain resolution rates for those with anxiety.
- Patel KV, Guralnik JM, Dansie EJ, et al. <u>Prevalence and impact of pain among older adults</u> in the United States: findings from the 2011 National Health and Aging Trends Study. *Pain*. 2013 Dec;154(12):2649-57. Half of older adults have troubling pain that limits functioning,

CAM (Complementary and Alternative Medicine)

- A <u>five-minute cognitive-behavioral intervention</u> reduces the spread of pain and its unpleasantness over time.
- Optimization of vitamin D levels for patients with Fibromyalgia has a positive effect on the perception of pain and functional capacity
- Try this 15 minute relaxing series of back stretches or targeted methods for tense shoulder stretching using simple yoga movements.

- <u>Do not tamper with pain medications</u>, it can lead to a Prescription drug overdose., which is now the leading cause of accidental death.
