#### In the News

- AMA urges CDC to remove restrictive limits in opioid prescribing guide that add stigma & deny access to care.
- The <u>Declaration of Montreal</u>, called for access to pain management as a "fundamental human right" its relevance 10 years later.
- North Carolina doctor loses his DEA license over tweets about opioid addiction at odds with a grieving NY mother's belief.
- As opioid prescribing rates have fallen, non-opioid prescriptions have risen. It is unclear if that translates to safer, more effective pain relief.
- Many critically ill <u>COVID patients are at risk for developing chronic pain</u> associated with acute pain, nerve damage or post-ICU syndrome.
- A California woman erroneously received an Amazon package containing oxycodone, morphine, other drugs instead of an inkpad.
- The FDA is seeking public comments on practices, & proposal to require genetic testing before prescribing codeine to children.
- Revised pain definition ...unpleasant sensory & emotional experience associated with or resembling ... actual or potential tissue damage,

- Rosa WE, Chittams J, Riegel B, et al.. Patient trade-offs related to analgesic use for cancer pain: a MaxDiff analysis study. *Pain Manag Nurs*. 2020 Jun; 21(3):245-54. Addiction concerns & the need to focus on cancer treatments may make patients hesitant to use analgesics.
- Kim J, Thomsen T, Sell N, et al. <u>Abdominal and testicular pain: An atypical presentation of COVID-19</u>. *Am J Emerg Med*. 2020 Jul; 38(7): 1542.e1–1542.e3, Atypical presentations of COVID-19, including abdominal & testicular pain have been reported & increase exposures.
- Zhili X, Linglong C, Shuang J, et al. Comparing the analgesic effect of intravenous paracetamol with morphine on patients with renal colic pain: A meta-analysis of randomized controlled studies. *Am J Emerg Med*. 2020 Jul;38(7):1470-1474. Five RCT results are inconsistent, but pooled data suggests IV acetaminophen for renal colic is the same or better than morphine at relieving pain with fewer side effects.
- Deer TR, Grider JS, Lamer TJ, et al. A systematic literature review of spine neurostimulation therapies for the treatment of pain. *Pain Med.* 2020 Nov 7;21(7):1421-1432. After failed back surgery or CRPS, <u>spinal stimulation is better than reoperation or medical management</u>.
- Balice-Bourgois C, Zumstein-Shaha M, Vanoni F, et al. A systematic review of clinical practice guidelines for acute procedural pain on neonates. Clin J Pain. 2020 2020 May;36(5):390-398. Suggested therapies (pharmacological &/or nondrug), parental involvement, interprofessional collaboration, and the environment help cut neonatal procedural pain which is known to affect subsequent pain sensitivity.
- Othman R, Dassanayake S, Jayakaran P, et al. Relationships between psychological, social, physical activity and sleep measures and somatosensory function in individuals with spinal pain: a systematic review and meta-analysis. *Clin J Pain*. 2020 Feb;36(2):124-134. Among 17 factors studied catastrophizing, depression & pain-related fear are linked to pain thresholds, thus increasing sensitivity to pain.
- Maheshwari K, Avitsian R, Sessler DI, et al. <u>Multimodal analgesic regimen for spine surgery</u>: a randomized placebo-controlled trial. *Anesthesiology*. 2020 May;132(5):992-1002. Preemptive APAP, gabapentin, lidocaine & ketamine didn't lower postop pain or opioids use.

- Hales CM, Martin CB, Gu Q. <u>Prevalence of prescription pain medication use among adults</u>: U.S., 2015–2018. NCHS Data Brief No. 369, June 2020. A representative sample of adults interviewed by the NCHS showed after a rise in prescription opioid use 2011-2014, the 2018 number of Americans is slightly (n.s.) less than in 2009, but the same as those now taking prescribed non-opioid pain relievers.
- Verret M, Lauzier F, Zarychanski R, et al. Perioperative use of gabapentinoids for the management of postoperative acute pain: a systematic review and meta-analysis. *Anesthesiology*. 2020 Aug;133(2):265-279. Perioperative gabapentinoid risks exceed negligible benefits.
- Quiton RL, Leibel DK, Boyd EL, et al. Sociodemographic patterns of pain in an urban community sample: an examination of intersectional effects of sex, race, age, and poverty status. *Pain*. 2020 May;161(5):1044-51. Older urbanites are twice as likely to have musculoskeletal pain, regardless of race or gender. Women living in poverty are more likely to report pain than men (true for Whites and African Americans.
- Gudin J, Fudin J. A narrative <u>pharmacological review of Buprenorphine</u>: A unique opioid for the treatment of chronic pain. *Pain Ther.* 2020 Jun;9(1):41-54. Buprenorphine's unique pharmacodynamics promote analgesia & reduce adverse effects; making it a good choice for pain.
- Pask S, Dell'Olio M, et al. The effects of opioids on cognition in older adults with cancer and chronic non-cancer pain: A systematic review. *J Pain Symptom Manage*. 2020 Apr;59(4):871-893. At doses above 120MME older adult cognition may improve or decline with opioids.
- Martinez-Calderon J, Flores-Cortes M, et al. Which psychological factors are involved in the onset and/or persistence of musculoskeletal pain? An umbrella review of systematic reviews and meta-analyses of prospective cohort studies. Clin J Pain. 2020 Aug;36(8):626-637.
   Enhanced self-efficacy with optimism about recovery, better mental health & active coping may protect against chronic musculoskeletal pain.

#### Complementary Integrative Health

- Emotional awareness and expression therapy, may reduce pain better than Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for older adults with pain
- Directing energy away from pain toward creative expressions like music, art, or crafts; can help even when pain persists.
- A summary of the evidence that <u>acupuncture relieves different types of pain</u> compared with sham acupuncture.
- <u>CBT reduced migraine frequency</u> in adolescents, possibly by increasing frontal to amygdala connectivity.
- Home based Virtual Reality reduced pain, improved activity, mood & sleep in patients with fibromyalgia or chronic low back pain.
