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In the News

- One in five (20 million) Americans have high-impact chronic pain preventing them from working or doing basic self-care activities.
- A novel TRPV1-agonist is a promising experimental drug for postoperative pain that desensitizes pain-conducting nerve with a single shot.
- <u>Different perspectives from the front lines</u> of the chronic pain, illicit drugs and substance use disorder public health problems.
- Chronic Pain Task Force pleads with State Medicaid officials to show data before enacting Oregon's proposed forced taper rule.
- Former CDC Director, <u>champion of the opioid prescribing guidelines</u>, <u>arrested</u> on third degree sex abuse & other sexual misconduct charges.
- <u>HRSA grants</u> to <u>Combat the Opioid Crisis</u>, and NIH programs to <u>better understand / treat Acute to Chronic Pain</u> announced.
- Legislation requires FDA to develop evidence-based opioid prescribing guidelines for treating acute pain; & focus on non-opioid treatments.
- Senate approved the "comprehensive" Opioid Crisis Response Act of 2018, imposing new limits without ensuring access to pain treatments

- O'Brien AT, Deitos A, Triñanes Pego Y, et al. Defective endogenous pain modulation in fibromyalgia: A meta-analysis of temporal summation and conditioned pain modulation paradigms. *J Pain*. 2018 Aug;19(8):819-836. Specific biomarker & neurologic responses to repetitive stimuli may change the way fibromyalgia is understood & diagnosed as a defect in the endogenous pain modulation system.
- Paice JA. Navigating <u>cancer pain management in the midst of the opioid epidemic</u>. Oncology. 2018 Aug 15;32(8):386-90, 403. Opioids are essential for cancer pain management, but assessment and mitigation of related risks is necessary to prevent unpleasant & harmful effects.
- Martin SR, Cohen LL, Mougianis I, et al. <u>Stigma and pain in adolescents hospitalized for sickle cell</u> vaso-occlusive pain episodes. *Clin J Pain*. 2018 May;34(5):438-444. Teen patients with sickle cell disease face stigma, pain, social isolation, disability, & longer hospital stays.
- Herzig SJ, Calcaterra SL, Mosher HJ, et al. Safe opioid prescribing for acute noncancer pain in hospitalized adults: a systematic review of existing guidelines. J Hosp Med. 2018 Apr;13(4):256-262. <u>Consensus statement</u> with 16 recommendations supporting prudent use of <u>oral</u> <u>opioids in hospitalized adults</u> to treat severe acute pain or refractory moderate pain with the lowest dose for the shortest duration possible.
- Doctor JN, Nguyen A, Lev R, et al. Opioid prescribing decreases after learning of a patient's fatal overdose. Science. 2018 Aug 10;361 (6402):588-590. Medical examiners sent prescribers notices of a fatal overdose resulted in fewer opioids prescribed in subsequent months.
- Nelson S, Simons L, Logan D. The incidence of adverse childhood experiences and their association with pain-related and psychosocial impairment in <u>youth with chronic pain</u>. *Clin J Pain*. 2018 May;34(5):402-408. Most children with chronic pain had a prior traumatic event.
- Sloan G, Shillo P, Selvarajah D, et al. <u>A new look at painful diabetic neuropathy</u>. *Diabetes Res Clin Pract*. 2018 Sep 7;144:177-191. Given its growing prevalence and burden, scientists are identifying new mechanism-based therapies for painful diabetic neuropathy.
- Wang X, Yi Y, Tang D, et al. Gabapentin as an adjuvant therapy for prevention of acute phantom-limb pain in pediatric patients undergoing amputation for malignant bone tumors: a prospective double-blind randomized controlled trial. *J Pain Symptom Manage*. 2018. Mar;55(3): 721-727. When used for a month before surgery, <u>gabapentin lessened phantom limb pain in children</u> without serious adverse effects.

- Fink DS, Schleimer JP, Sarvet A, et al. <u>Association between prescription drug monitoring programs and nonfatal and fatal drug overdoses</u>. *Ann Intern Med.* 2018 Jun 5;168(11):783-790. PDMPs don't consistently cut overdose rates and may have unintended consequences.
- Hill MV, Stucke RS, McMahon ML, et al. An educational intervention decreases opioid prescribing after general surgical operations. *Ann Surg.* 2018 Mar;267(3):468-472. For 5 common surgeries, <u>education program cut the number of pills prescribed by 53%</u> when compared before the intervention. Only one of 246 patients needed a refill and 85% of the other patients used either NSAID or acetaminophen without an opioid.
- Andoh J, Milde C, Tsao JW, et al. Cortical plasticity as a basis of phantom limb pain: Fact or fiction? *Neuroscience*. 2018 Sep 1;387:85-91. Although unknowns remain, <u>phantom limb pain is though to result from central & peripheral sensory-motor changes</u> described in this article.
- Cozowicz C, Chung F, Doufas AG, et al. Opioids for acute pain management in patients with obstructive sleep apnea: A systematic review. Anesth Analg. 2018 Oct;127(4):988-1001. Greatest risk for <u>respiratory depression with sleep apnea</u> is within 24 hours of the 1st opioid dose.
- Ruffle JK, Coen SJ, Giampietro V, et al. Preliminary report: parasympathetic tone links to functional brain networks during the anticipation and experience of visceral pain. *Sci Rep.* 2018 Sep 7;8(1):13410. Activating the parasympathetic nervous system can reduce visceral pain.
- Bohnert ASB, Guy GP Jr, Losby JL. Opioid Prescribing in the United States Before and After the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's 2016 Opioid Guideline. Ann Intern Med. 2018. 2018 Sep 18;169(6):367-375. <u>Despite a 36% reduction in opioid prescribing, the</u> <u>number of overdose-related deaths continue to rise</u>, with illicit fentanyl & heroin driving higher death rates.

Pain Resources on the Web:

- The problem of patient abandonment is reportedly growing as does pressure on the supply from lower quotas & prescribing limits of opioids.
- The Oregon Pain Management Commission Toolbox that includes materials to improve the understanding & treatment of chronic pain
- The Agency for Healthcare Research & Quality posted a systematic review on Noninvasive Nonpharmacological Treatment for Chronic Pain

Complementary Integrative Health (formerly called Complementary Alternative Medicine [CAM])

- Yoga therapists are distinct from yoga teachers and increasingly being integrated into inter-professional pain teams.
- Relaxation techniques for pain relief & general health has a growing body of research supporting it as a safe, effective modality.
- Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulation (TENS) cuts pain & opioid use after heart surgery with respiratory functioning & coughing.
- Opioids may lower interest to try nondrug treatments for chronic back pain as most prescribed them decline Cognitive Behavioral Therapy.
- Internet-based CBT & educational groups cut healthcare costs by \$4,500 per year for adolescents with chronic pain.
- Funding opportunity announced to study the effects of music therapy on the brain or overall health.
