PCAs Quick Reference: Caring for the Transgender and Non-Binary Patient Population

<u>What is a Transgender patient?</u> a person whose gender identity and assigned sex at birth do not correspond (sometimes abbreviated as trans). Other helpful definitions include:

Cisgender - a person whose gender identity and assigned sex at birth correspond **Gender non-conforming** - describes a gender expression that differs from a given society's norms for males and females

Genderqueer - describes a person whose gender identity falls outside of the traditional binary gender paradigm of identifying as either a man/boy/male or woman/girl/female

This is important to understand because the population is changing nationally, in Massachusetts and at MGH.

- Disproportionate health disparities in the transgender & nonbinary population has led to higher rates of suicide, social stressors
- 1.4 million adults identify as transgender or nonbinary in the U.S.A., 29,900 adults identify as transgender in the state of Massachusetts.
- MGH is committed to providing a welcoming environment for LGBTQ Patients, Visitors and Staff.

What do you need to know?

- Transgender patients are vulnerable and it is important for them to feel SAFE.
- Treat patients with DIGNITY and RESPECT.

What is the role of the PCA (under the direction of the RN)?

- Create a safe environment by asking questions such as "what name do you go by?"
- Introduce yourself by stating your name and the pronouns that you prefer. This invites the patient to feel open in stating their preferred pronouns also. **Honor** their identity.
- It is important to listen to, understand, and mirror the terms that patients use to describe
 themselves. Keep in mind that some people do not like to label their sexual orientation or
 gender identity.
- Avoid assumptions: Don't **assume** you know a person's gender identity or sexual orientation based on how they look or sound.
- If you make a mistake (we all make mistakes- we're human!), acknowledge it, apologize and move on.
- **Create a trans-affirming environment:** transgender patients are especially vulnerable when coming to the hospital.
