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In the News

- Misuse of Vicodin among High School students is down ~ 25%, with accessibility of prescription drugs for <u>non-medical use lowered.</u>
- Washington laws intended to curb methadone deaths results in clinics refusing to treat pain patients and needless suffering
- Exparel, a <u>long-acting injectable local anesthetic</u> (Bupivacaine) that can now provide 3 days of relief after a surgery.
- New <u>Pediatric Acetaminophen</u> concentrations are meant to reduce potential medication errors, but heed warning during the transition to use up or get rid of old 100mg/mL dosing used as infant drops. Following current instructions using old formulas could be dangerous.
- There is a nation-wide <u>shortage of injectable hydromorphone</u> <u>and ketorolac</u> due to increase in demand, and manufacturing delays.
- DEA is investigating the "CVS Florida High Prescribers" list deny patients pain medicine based on their prescriber.

- Katz J, Clarke H, Seltzer Z. (2011). Review article: <u>Preventive analgesia</u>: quo vadimus? *Anesth Analg, 113* 2:1242-53. Good review of evidence that preventing pain and treating it before it gets bad can limit nerve sensitization that intensifies pain, making it harder to treat.
- Younger JW, Chu LF, D'Arcy NT, et al. (2011). Prescription opioid <u>analgesics rapidly change the human brain</u>. *Pain*, *152*:1803-10. Opioid exposure rapidly causes structural and functional changes in reward- and affect-processing areas of the brain. Significant volumetric changes (neuron loss) was found in 13 brain regions; more with higher doses; and enduring changes noted after the opioid was stopped.
- Slatkin NE, Lynn R, Su C, et al. (2011). Characterization of <u>abdominal pain during methylnaltrexone</u> treatment of opioid-induced constipation in advanced illness: a post hoc analysis of two clinical trials. *J Pain Symptom Manage*, 42:754-60. Successful BM within 4 hours of methylnaltrexone for 80% of patients but had uncomfortable cramps that lessens over time 23% on 1st dose & 13% on 2nd dose.
- Senkowski D, Kautz J, Hauck M, et al. (2011). Emotional Facial Expressions Modulate Pain-Induced Beta and Gamma Oscillations in Sensorimotor Cortex. *J Neurosci*, *31* (41):14542-50. Face expressions of others during pain can affect perception of & response to pain.
- Mezei L, Murinson BB, et al. (2011) Pain education in North American medical schools. *J Pain*, 12 (12):1199-208. Little content on pain, is taught in Medical Schools falling short of curriculum content areas related to pain as established by IASP, but most have some content.

- Herr K, Coyne PJ, McCaffery M, et al. <u>Pain assessment in the patient unable to self-report</u>: A position statement with clinical practice recommendations. *Pain Management Nursing*, 12 (4): 230-250. Seminal article revisited with a systematic review of rapidly emerging research. Guides pain assessment of difficult to assess populations covering neonates to the end of life, critically ill, dementia and more.
- Oldenmenger WH, Sillevis Smitt PA, van Montfort CA, (2011). <u>A combined pain consultation and pain education program</u> decreases average and current pain and decreases interference in daily life by pain in oncology outpatients: a randomized controlled trial. *Pain.* 152 (11):2632-9. Education & consultation programs worked better when combined to reduce pain, improve function & treatment adherence.
- Moskovitz BL, Benson CJ, Patel AA, et al.(2011). Analgesic treatment for moderate-to-severe acute pain in the United States: Patients' perspectives in the Physicians Partnering Against Pain Survey. J Opioid Manag, 7(4):277-286. A survey of 56,851 patients & MDs showed nearly half were undertreated (25% no analgesic) due to provider not prescribing; concerns over side effects or addiction & cost.
- Arnstein P, Broglio K, Wuhrman E, et al. (2011) Use of <u>Placebos in Pain Management</u>. Pain Management Nursing, 12 (4): 225-229.
 Update of a position statement indicating that the clinical use of placebos outside the context of an IRB approved study is unethical.
- Mills AM, Frances S. Shofer FS, Boulis AK, et al. (2011). <u>Racial disparity in analgesic treatment</u> for ED patients with abdominal or back pain. *Am J Emerg Med*, *29*, 752–756. Nonwhites are less likely to receive any pain treatment & wait longer for treatment when provided.
