In the News

- Pain patients describe how policies to curtail the opioid crisis have created hardships & in some cases ideation or completion of suicide.
- Nurse denied life insurance because she carries naloxone, despite the Surgeon General recommending more people to do.
- CMS will remove communication about pain as a quality measure in October 2019, fearing a rise in opioid use.
- A national recall of infants' ibuprofen oral suspension was announced due to the risk of a higher than listed concentration.
- Illicit Fentanyl accounts for 90% of opioid overdose deaths in Massachusetts, with heroin linked to 37% of fatalities.
- Oregon will enact plan to force Medicaid patients off opioid pain treatments; offering physical therapy or acupuncture instead.
- Mayday Foundation is offering Fellowships to develop leading spokespersons in the field. Apply by January 21, 2019
- A <u>disease-modifying osteoarthritis drug</u> that reduces cartilage degeneration receives fast-track designation from the FDA.
- The 2018 Farm Bill may legalize hemp cultivation and remove the Schedule I status from CBD products, enabling research & use for pain.
- HHS public comment period on best ways to treat chronic pain and improve access to treatments multimodal treatment.
- FDA found dozens of kratom products tainted with toxic levels of nickel & lead considered unsafe for consumption.
- FDA approved an intrathecal pump enhancement allowing PCA (patient controlled) doses be administered via a smartphone app.
- FDA approved a mobile app "reSET-O" providing multi-media cognitive behavioral therapy & supporting buprenorphine adherence.
- Clinicians, specialists & scholars explore ways to help unintended victims of the opioid crackdown; the undertreated, sick & ignored.

- Bérubé M, Gélinas C, Martorella G, et al. Development and acceptability assessment of a self-management intervention to prevent acute to chronic pain transition after major lower extremity trauma. *Pain Manag Nurs*. 2018 Dec;19(6):671-692. A thoughtful implementation of a <u>biopsychosocial approach to preventing chronic pain</u> with evidence-based approaches deemed acceptable to patients and professionals.
- Al B, Sunar MM, Zengin S, et al. Comparison of IV dexketoprofen trometamol, fentanyl, and paracetamol in the treatment of renal colic in the ED: A randomized controlled trial. Am J Emerg Med. 2018;36:571-576. ED patients in Turkey with <u>renal colic responded better to the</u> IV-NSAID dexketoprofen at 30 minutes than 10mg/kg IV acetaminophen or 10mcg/kg IV fentanyl; with few side effects across groups.
- Deng LX, Patel K, Miaskowski C, et al. Prevalence and characteristics of moderate to severe pain among hospitalized older adults. *J Am Geriatr Soc.* 2018, 66(9):1744-51. Many hospitalized older adults have moderate-severe pain that is more difficult to treat if pain is chronic.

- El-Boghdadly K, Pawa A, Chin KJ. Local anesthetic systemic toxicity: current perspectives. *Local Reg Anesth.* 2018 Aug 8;11:35-44. Review of Local Anesthetic Systemic Toxicity (LAST), a life-threatening adverse event increasingly prevalent with greater use of local anesthetics.
- Darnall BD, Juurlink D, Kerns RD, et al. International stakeholder community of pain experts and leaders call for an urgent action on forced opioid tapering. *Pain Med.* 2018 [Epub] International <u>experts speak out against forced opioid tapering</u> as a large-scale humanitarian issue. Rapid tapering destabilizes patients, precipitating severe withdrawal, disability, pain/suffering & even death of chronic pain patients.
- Albrecht DS, Forsberg A, Sandström A, et al. Brain glial activation in fibromyalgia A multi-site positron emission tomography investigation. Brain Behav Immun. 2019 Jan;75:72-83. Fibromyalgia patients have neuroinflammation mediated by glial cell activation in the CNS.
- Duncan RW, Smith KL, Maguire M, et al. Alternatives to opioids for pain management in the emergency department decreases opioid usage and maintains patient satisfaction. Am J Emerg Med. 2019 Jan;37(1):38-44. Multimodal therapy in <u>ED reduced IV opioid use 20%</u> in a year.
- Szperka CL, VanderPluyum J, Orr SL, et al. Recommendations on the use of Anti-CGRP monoclonal antibodies in children & adolescents. *Headache*, 2018. 58(10):1658-69. <u>Anti-CGRP drugs can be used cautiously to treat select children with headaches</u> given safety for adults.
- Fisher E, Law E, et al. Psychological therapies for the management of chronic and recurrent pain in children and adolescents. *Cochrane Database Syst Rev.* 2018 Sep 29;9 :CD003968. Cognitive/behavioral therapy should be a standard part of treating pediatric chronic pain.
- Shin S. Safety of celecoxib versus traditional nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs in older patients with arthritis. J Pain Res. 2018 Dec. (11): 3211-19. <u>Risks to older celecoxib users</u> were less for GI bleed, but higher for cardiovascular &/or renal events over other NSAIDs for > 4 mo.

Pain Resources on the Web:

- Consider if pain in the back, buttock, ankle or foot may really be a symptom of Ankylosing Spondylitis; a treatable inflammatory condition.
- U.S. Pain Foundation has a helpful fact sheet and good resources for learning to live with chronic pain.
- Microglia support nerve structure & immune functions, contributing to chronic pain by adjusting sensitivity to pain.
- National Institute of Nursing Research's evidence-based materials for professionals, parents & families of children with life-limiting disease

Complementary Integrative Health (formerly called Complementary Alternative Medicine [CAM])

- Yoga can help relieve low-back pain & neck pain, but benefits for headache, arthritis, fibromyalgia, or carpal tunnel remain unproven.
- Mindfulness may blunt pain by affecting sensory, cognitive, and affective appraisals linked to posterior cingulate cortex functioning.
- Research hasn't clarified the best music to relieve pain, but a tempo of 60-80bpm, instrumental, percussion or nature sounds can help.
- Yoga, music & relaxation may help during the peripartum period with the best evidence supporting relaxation during the latent labor phase
- Interest is growing in integrative approaches to relieve acute or chronic pain in children, with growing evidence of safety & effectiveness.
