






WHY DO YOU NEED WARFARIN (COUMADIN®)?

- o "blood thinner"
- To prevent or treat blood clots

This is how a blood clot might look inside a blood vessel



Thrombus = Blood Clot



- •Heart attack






HERE ARE COMMON REASONS WHY PEOPLE TAKE WARFARIN:

- •Arms




The location of the clot gives clues to symptoms.

THE INR IS THE NAME OF YOUR BLOOD TEST

- INR = International Normalized Ratio
- The goal is to stay in a specified INR range
- It is normal to vary

BLOOD TESTS ARE IMPORTANT SO WE KNOW HOW YOUR WARFARIN IS WORKING

- o Get your blood test done when asked
- If you get a phone message, email or letter about missing blood tests, CALL the number given



REMINDER CALLS FOR MISSING BLOOD TESTS

- If you missed your blood test date, we will remind you
- Reminder phone calls are made when 2 days late around 6 pm

How often do you need Blood Tests?

- When you first start, testing is often
- o Later, it will be less
- There are many reasons you may be asked to have your blood tested more often
- We will provide a Standing Order for your INR blood test at MGH (valid at other Partners hospitals). This is preferred.
- If not possible to travel to a Partners hospital laboratory, we will provide an order for an different lab.

BE AWARE OF FACTORS THAT MIGHT CHANGE YOUR INR



Medications

- prescription
- over-the-counter
 - Tylenol
 - Aspirin
- minerals & herbals




Being sick



- Nausea, vomiting and/or diarrhea for more than 2 days
- Fever

MORE FACTORS THAT MIGHT CHANGE YOUR INR





Alcohol

1 drink = 12 oz. beer or 5 oz. wine or 1.5 oz. liquor






WHAT IF YOU MISS A DOSE?



- Take your regular dose as soon as possible if you remember before midnight
- Never double your dose
- Call your AMS nurse about any missed doses

Helpful Hints:

- Take at same time daily
- Use pill box



How do you know how much warfarin to take?

- We send you a letter or email after each INR
- Read the letter or email carefully for any changes
- o If you do not receive the letter within 4 days or email 1 day after a blood test, call your **AMS nurse**
- If you need a dose change right away, we will call you



HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS NEED TO KNOW YOUR EXACT DOSE

It's important for you to know:

- 1) How many pills to take each day
- 2) Color of your prescribed mg strength

Your doctor needs to know:

- 1) Mg per day
- 2) Pill strength you use

Share this information for:

- ✓ Requesting refills
- √ Hospitalizations
- ✓ Doctor visits and questions about your medication list

How do you get refills?

- Call the doctor who prescribes warfarin
- Your AMS nurse can help with a refill request during business hours

WHEN TO CALL 911 ---DANGER SIGNS---



- o Chest pain, discomfort in arms, back, neck, or jaw
- Trouble breathing
- Severe headache, confusion or numbness
- Sudden vision changes
- Stroke signs:

- Fall or injury to your head
- Throwing up blood (might be bright red or looks like coffee grounds)
- Bleeding you cannot stop

- Wear proper safety gear

PREVENT FALLS



- Remove hazards
 - Clear clutter from stairs
 - Remove scatter rugs
- Use safety devices
 - Walkers, canes, stair rails
- Improve lighting
 - Night lights

YOU MAY NEED TO STOP YOUR WARFARIN A FEW DAYS BEFORE CERTAIN PROCEDURES

- The doctor who prescribes your warfarin should be the one to provide instructions
- Call your **AMS nurse** about:
 - Colonoscopy
 - Dental surgery
 - Heart procedures
 - Steroid injection
 - Surgery

TIPS FOR TRAVELING

- Tell your AMS nurse:
 - Dates you plan to be away
 - How we can contact you
- Carry medicines with you
- Do NOT place medicines in checked luggage

Call your **AMS nurse** if your telephone or address change





PREGNANCY / BREASTFEEDING

- If pregnant, you should NOT take warfarin
- Use appropriate form of birth control
- Talk with your doctor to make plans for pregnancy or breastfeeding

AMS Patient Agreement

Anticoagulation therapy [commonly using warfarin (Coumadin®)] has certain risks due to the number of lifestyle and health related changes that influence the way your body uses these drugs. Safe management will help lower the risks of bleeding or clotting. This requires timely INR testing and follow-up by your warfarin (Coumadin®) manager. To remain with AMS you must be responsible to:
