Rapid Response Team

A team of responders activated for an acute unexpected change in clinical condition

Composed of the patient's primary team and:

- Adult
- Pediatric
- Newborn

Rapid Response Team

Signs of Opioid Overdose may include:

- Unresponsive and unconscious
- Slow or no breathing
- Gurgling or snoring sounds
- Blue/grey lips or nails
- Nasal Narcan (naloxone) spray
should be administered immediately

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Reasons for a Rapid Response:

- Chest Pain
- Bleeding
- Low BP
- Low SPO2



PCA Role:

- Vital signs
- ECG
- Phlebotomy



Code Stroke



If you see any of these symptoms
Call for HELP

PCA Role in Code Stroke

- Per RN direction:
- stay with the patient and do requested tasks
 - VS, blood sugar (low BS can mimic signs of a stroke), phlebotomy, ECG



Code Stroke Responsibilities

- Prepare patient for an emergency CT scan
- An IV nurse may arrive to put in a STAT IV
- Patient may be transferred to the Neuro ICU depending on CT results
